Rome – Bishop Philip Egan

e had a great diocesan youth pilgrimage
to Rome last week! 35 of us, led and
superbly organised by Canon PJ, set off
very early from Gatwick on Monday
28th July to Rome's Fiumicino airport. From there,
we transferred to our hotel, Hotel Lancelot, near the
Colosseum. We travelled at the invitation of the
Pope who wanted us to keep the Holy Year Jubilee
of Youth so

of Youth, so during the week we did the various jubilee spiritual exercises – as well as some tourism and the consumption of



much pasta! Once settled into the hotel, we began with a walk across the city to the English College for Mass in the chapel. There are four major basilicas in Rome, and the tradition is to pass through the Holy Door of each, so on Tuesday we visited Santa Maria Maggiore in the morning and St. Peter's in the afternoon. We also made a fascinating visit to the Vatican Museums and the Sistine Chapel.

On Wednesday, we covered some of the sights of Rome, beginning with a pilgrimage to Santa Maria sopra Minerva to pray at the casket of Bl. Pier Giorgio Frassati, whose body had been brought to Rome for the veneration of the youth. Thousands of young people from all over the world milled around and there were special talks in the church throughout the day on Frassati and his life and example. We explored the Pantheon, the Spanish Steps, the Pontifical Gregorian University, where years ago I was a student, and Piazza Navona where we had lunch and enjoyed some free time.

On Thursday we went to Tre Fontane where St. Paul was martyred and visited the basilica of St. Paul's outside the Walls to pass through its Holy Door. Later that day, we went to the catacombs of St. Callixtus where we celebrated Mass. The hotel was two blocks from a beautiful church, San Clemente, and Friday began with Mass there on the high altar. In the afternoon, we went to St. John Lateran's to pass through the Holy Door and then on to the Circus Maximus, where there was an opportunity for pilgrims to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The highlight of the week was the weekend, with a hike to Tor Vergata on the outskirts of Rome, a massive sports complex. Here in the evening the Holy Father conducted a Vigil of Prayer with over one million youngsters attending. The bishops were taken by a special convoy of buses to and from Tor Vergata and while our youth valiantly slept overnight on the field, we returned late that night after the Vigil then left early again next morning for the Sunday Mass with the Pope. I was seated about four rows away from him. After free time on Sunday afternoon, we left Rome next morning to return to England.

Our young people – and all of us - had an inspiring time. The young people with us were really impressive. They came from across the diocese from Guernsey in the south to Windsor in the east. Please pray for them and for all of us that our prayer and pilgrimage will make us grow stronger in faith,


hope and love.

Consuming Fire

ur God is a consuming fire, the Scriptures tell us (see Hebrews 12:29; Deuteronomy 4:24).

And in this week's Gospel, Jesus uses the image of fire to describe the demands of discipleship. The fire He has come to cast on the earth is the fire that He wants to blaze in each of our hearts. He made us from the dust of the earth (see Genesis 2:7) and filled us with the fire of the Holy Spirit in Baptism (see Luke 3:16).

We were baptized into His death (see Romans 6:3). This is the baptism our Lord speaks of in the Gospel this week. The baptism with which He must be baptized is His passion and death, by which He accomplished our redemption and sent forth the fire



of the Spirit on the earth (see Acts 2:3).

The fire has been set, but it is not yet blazing. We are called to enter deeper into the consuming love of God. We must examine our consciences and our actions, submitting ourselves to the revealing fire of God's Word (see 1 Corinthians 3:13).

In our struggle against sin, we have not yet resisted to the point of shedding our own blood, Paul tells us in this week's Epistle. We have not undergone the suffering that Jeremiah suffers in the First Reading this week.

But this is what true discipleship requires. To be a disciple is to be inflamed with the love of the God. It is to have an unquenchable desire for holiness and zeal for the salvation of our brothers and sisters.

Being His disciple does not bring peace in the false way that the world proclaims peace (see Jeremiah 8:11). It means division and hardship. It may bring us to conflict with our own flesh and blood.

But Christ is our peace (see Ephesians 2:14). By

But Christ is our peace (see Ephesians 2:14). By His Cross He has lifted us up from the mire of sin and death—as He will rescue the prophet Jeremiah (see Jeremiah 38:10).

And as we sing in the Psalm this week, we trust in our deliverer

Solar Farm Plan could be "blight on the landscape" on English stretch of Camino says Bishop Philip Egan

ur bishop, Philip Egan, has expressed concern about a proposal to build a huge solar farm on the English stretch of the Camino de Santiago. The English leg of the highly popular and historic pilgrimage runs 68 miles from the city of Reading to the port of Southampton, which falls within the Diocese of Portsmouth and has been frequented by pilgrims for more than a thousand years.

The Camino de Santiago is made up of many different ancient routes across Europe that all lead to the tomb of St. James in Santiago de Compostela in northwest Spain.

English pilgrims would traditionally take a boat from Portsmouth and sail to Spain before continuing their pilgrimage.

In an email exchange with Catholic News Agency, Bishop
Philip expressed his worries about the proposal. "The proposal to build a large solar farm seems unfortunate and I can understand any villager, farmer, or lover of the South Downs feeling saddened at the loss of land and the potential blight on the landscape, even if there are several other areas of the South Downs given over to solar

farms." The South Downs is a highly popular national park through which the historic route runs.

"Since I became bishop of Portsmouth in 2012, I have been very aware of this venerable Camino route from Reading to Southampton," he said. "Our parish in Reading, dedicated to St. James and standing in the ruins of

the pre-Reformation abbey, is the official starting point of the Camino."
"Indeed, only last year, I went out to greet four American bishops hiking the trail and who were staying in a farmhouse near Alton, Hampshire," he continued. "Much of the central part of the route through Hampshire is idyllic; it is very rural, and you feel far away from the hectivity of modern life. As you walk along, it is easy to feel part of a spiritual exercise that goes back to medieval times."

Egan said he hoped the ancient route would still be marked out in some way, adding: "I wonder too if they might install paneling and other measures to hide the solar cells and safeguard the most attractive views?"

According to a report in the *Daily Telegraph*, the proposed Stokes Lane Solar Farm will supply energy to

9,390 homes every year for 40 years.
